LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Overview and Insights into Active Bills in the Current Term of the Legislature.

First session of the 2-year , 152nd General Assembly, convening 1/10/2023 and ending 6/30/2023.

Legislative Awareness Working (LAW) Group – April 2023

Voting Changes

- SB₃ "Constitutional Amendment to Eliminate Limitations on Absentee Ballots", allows for no-excuse absentee voting.
- HB43 "Allow Independent Voters to Vote in Primary" – 170K Independent voters. Would not allow crossover voting. No Action.
- SB26 "Constitutional Amendment (2nd Leg) to Update Minimum Voting Age to 18", this is a technical correction to align with the US Constitution and federal law. Introduced by Bryant Richardson. Passed Senate, sent to House.
- SB79 "Term Limits for Legislators, AG, Insurance Commissioner, Auditor & State Treasurer" 2 terms for state-wide offices, 4 terms for Senator, 7 terms for Representative.
 - Sponsored by Sen. Buckson & Rep. Ramone
- HB77 "Constitutional Amendment Requiring General Assembly Members to Remain Domiciled in the Districts They Represent", 2nd leg of this amendment.

Taxes

- HB89 "Increase Standard Deduction for DE Taxes", includes increase in "refundable" earned income tax credit to 7.5%.
 - Passed House 39-0
- HB36 was submitted by Rep. Bush (superceding HB71, previously submitted by Rep. Ramone).
 Reduces real estate transfer tax from 4% back down to 3%.
 Moving through Committees.
- HB29 "\$750 Elderly Property Tax Credit", submitted by Rep. Hensley. Moving through Committees.
- HB62 "Reassessments Every 5 yrs", assures taxation at "present fair market value."
- HB42 "Eliminate 10% Increase Option for Property Taxes after Reassessment" – Tabled in committee.
- HB67 "Realty Tax Exemption for 2nd Home
 Transaction in 12 Months" Tabled in committee.

Voting, Budget & Admin

2^{nd} Am'dm't & Justice

- SCR12 "Declaring Gun Violence a Public Health Crisis"
 - Non-binding resolution that sets the foundation for future "gun control" legislation.
 - Passed in Senate (14-6, 1 abs) & House by voice votes.
- SB2 "Permit to Purchase Handguns"
 - Recurrent training (within 5 years), fingerprinting & SBI background check required to
 exercise "right" to purchase a handgun. Many of these requirements are redundant with
 checks already in place for background checks at time of purchase. Valid for only 180 days,
 requiring renewal. Training vouchers available for low-income persons (200% poverty level).
 - Senate Judiciary Hearing, 12-2pm, 4/26.
- Previous Legislation Passed in 2022 has Court Challenges
 - HB450 Preventing sale or possession of certain semi-automatic rifles and pistols (so-called "Assault Weapons") and SS1 for SB6 Preventing sale or possession of ammunition magazines that have a capacity exceeding 17 rounds (so called "High Capacity" magazines) are being challenged by the DSSA in US District Court.
 - The District Court judge denied a petition for an injunction against implementing these bans.
 - HB451 Eliminating sale of firearms to individuals 18-20 yo, in probable constitutional violation (legal adults having constitutional rights restricted) is being challenged in the Delaware Chancery Court.
- HB50 "Mail Theft"
 - Class A misdemeanor under \$1500, Class G felony \$1500 or more. Bi-partisan support.
 Voted out of committee & on Ready List for House.

Pro-Life & Family

- HB74 "Abrogates the Seal of Catholic Confession for Child Abuse/Neglect"
 - Mandatory Reporting by priests even if learned in sacramental confession.
 - No progress in committee
- SB59/SB58 "Government Control of Childcare Reimbursement Rates"
 - Establishes statewide wage for childcare rate for providers in Kent & Sussex that mirrors New Castle County rates. Eliminates childcare co-pay for 200% of the poverty level (as was done during COVID-19 emergency).
 - Both assigned to Finance committee
- SB43 "Signs to Raise Awareness of Human Trafficking"
 - Introduced by Sen. Richardson, with bipartisan support.
 - Assigned to Finance committee

- HCR28 "Atheist Awareness Day"
 - Designates March 30th, 2023
 - Introduced by Morrison, co-sponsored by Sturgeon
 - Passed House in Voice Vote, Passed Senate 11 Yes –
 1 No 8 Not Voting 1 absent
- HB70 "Elimination of the Death Penalty"
 - Establishes the penalty for first-degree murder that was committed after the person's 18th birthday as life imprisonment without benefit of probation, parole or any other reduction.
 - No progress in committee
- TBD (Previous Session HB140) "Assisted Suicide"
 - Legislation was voted out of committee in the House, but did not make it to a floor vote. It is expected to be reintroduced.
 - Assumes correct medical diagnosis and does not require the signing physician to even know the patient! There is no reference or consideration of "state of mind" of the patient.

• SB44 "Creation of the Office of New Americans"

- Foreign-born individuals comprise 9% of the State's population.
- Creates a bureaucratic "office" to promote "attraction, retention and inclusion of immigrants and refugees."
- to assist with naturalization and reduce exploitation and fraud against immigrants.

Increase immigrant access to English language instruction, connect them to legal services

Voted out of Elections & Government Affairs and sent to Senate Finance.

Various Legislation is anticipated in the following areas:

- Re-definition of Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity and Disability across Delaware Code.
- Extending existing language in the DE Constitution protecting immutable rights (sex, race, color and national origin) to include "sexual orientation, gender identity and disability" (fluid characteristics).
- Requiring student athletes to compete on teams/sports associated with their biological sex.
 Females may compete in male sports, where a corresponding female sport is not available.

Equal Rights

Environ -mental Issues

"Zero-Emission Vehicle" Regulations

- Require a complete phase-out of combustion engine cars and light trucks, 2026-2035, as called for by an interstate compact tying Delaware to California's regulatory model.
- Hearings held in all counties (Millsboro 3/21, Bellefonte 3/23, Glascow 3/28, Kent County 3/29, Newark 3/30). High turnout at first meeting (300+) largely opposed.
- Public Comment Period, 4/1-30. Virtual
 Public Hearing Scheduled 4/26 @ 6pm.

- SB51 "Eliminating Single-Service Plastic Implements, Straws & Polystyrene Foam Containers"
 - Prohibits polystyrene foam containers, single-service plastic coffee stirrers, cocktail picks or sandwich picks. Plastic straws only on request
 - Exemptions for fire companies, healthcare providers, non-profit and religious organizations.
 - Passed Senate (14-5, 1 abs, 1 nv) and sent to House committee.

Other Issues

- HB1 "Recreational Use of Marijuana"
 - Removes all penalties for use or possession of one ounce or less of marijuana for those 21 or over.
 - Passed House 28-13, passed Senate 16-4.
 Governor has signaled intention for it to become law without his signature.
- HB2 "The Delaware Marijuana Control Act"
 - Regulates and taxes marijuana for recreational use in much the same manner as alcohol.
 - Passed House 27-13, passed Senate 15-5.
 Governor has signaled intention for it to become law without his signature.
- **HB41 HA 1** "Digital Right to Repair Act"
 - Requires availability of parts, documentation, tools and updates to a consumer or local

- repair shop for phones, electronic games, etc... Act excludes motor vehicles manufacturers and dealers and also does not apply to off-road, farm, construction, marine, yard/garden or other outdoor power equipment.
- Submitted by Ruth Briggs-King.
- Reported out of committee in the House.
- SB29 "Retiree Healthcare Benefits Advisory Subcommittee"
 - Addressing unfunded liability and prior proposal to shift all state retirees from current "Medigap" plan to a state "Medicare Advantage" plan.
 - Benefits Advisory Subcommittee met 3/22, 3/27, 4/3 & week of 4/17. Final meeting planned week of 4/24.
 - Expected to communicate recommendations by May 1st deadline.

In Closing

- Legislative Sessions run 2 years (representative term), so all bills that were not acted on in 2022 will have to be resubmitted in this Session and will start from the beginning.
